## FORMAL STATEMENT

- 1. My full name is...
- 2. I am a registered medical practitioner, qualifying...
- 3. I am...
- 4. I am familiar with the Code of Conduct for Expert Witnesses and agree to abide by it.
- On the evening of Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> of November 2021, I conducted a medical examination on a five-year-old Cook Island Māori girl named, Geraldine WILLIAMS. I was assisted in this assessment by Amanda GREENWOOD, Te Puaruruhau nurse specialist.
- 6. This examination was conducted at Starship Children's Hospital.
- 7. Geraldine WILLIAMS was accompanied to the hospital by two members of the Police and her mother Christine.

## History

- 8. I spoke with Christine WILLIAMS and obtained a synopsis of what was alleged to have occurred.
- 9. I understand from the subsequent evidential interview that the alleged abuse included repeated anal penetration by a finger.
- 10. It appeared that the most recent episode of alleged abuse may have occurred on Sunday the 17<sup>th</sup> or Monday 18<sup>th</sup> of November, two or three days before I saw Geraldine.

- 11. I also obtained information from Christine WILLIAMS about how the family came to be in New Zealand from Australia and how they knew the ACCUSED in this matter, Sean Murphy.
- 12. I also obtained information from Christine WILLIAMS about Geraldine's past medical history, from the time of her birth until the time that I saw her.
- 13. Of particular relevance to Geraldine's presentation, was that (according to Christine WILLIAMS) she had never had significant constipation in the past.
- 14. Although she has occasionally had hard stools, she has never required medication or had significant pain. The weekend before I saw her was the first time that Geraldine had ever reported pain on passing a bowel motion.

## Examination

- 15. On examination of Geraldine, she looked well. She weighed 26 kilograms (above the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile for age) and was 123cm in height (also above the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile for age).
- 16. Her general physical examination was unremarkable.
- 17. She had widespread insect bites, which she had scratched.
- 18. Her genital examination was normal, with a normal pre-pubertal crescentic hymen.
- 19. However, on examination of the anus, there was a four-to-five-millimetre recent laceration in the skin of the anal verge at 12 o'clock.
- 20. This began at the anal verge and extended into the anal canal.
- 21. It was difficult to be entirely sure of the inner end of this laceration as Geraldine found it too painful when I applied traction on either side of the anus.
- 22. The laceration looked relatively recent in that the edges were still sharp and there was fresh white scab in the base of the laceration, but no granulation tissue.
- 23. The rest of the inspection of Geraldine's anus was normal.

24. Geraldine returned a negative result on routine screening tests (urine nucleic acid amplification tests) for sexually transmitted infections.

## Conclusion

- 25. In conclusion, Geraldine presented as a five-year-old girl who alleged an episode of sexual abuse involving digital penetration of the anus.
- 26. She had a small laceration of the anal verge.
- 27. A laceration of the anal verge is a non-specific finding.
- 28. That is, there are a number of possible explanations, including trauma, inflammatory or other skin conditions and constipation.
- 29. In this case, I think Geraldine's laceration is most likely to be traumatic in origin.
- 30. My reasons for this opinion are:
  - Geraldine had had no history of constipation (hard stools) to explain the sudden onset of a laceration the weekend before I saw her.
  - She had no other condition affecting the skin of the anus which could explain the presence of a laceration.
  - It is unusual for a laceration of the skin of the anus to develop for the first time in children of her age with no explanation.
- 31. Geraldine will be the subject of follow up care until her anal laceration has healed.

I confirm the truth and accuracy of this statement. I make this statement with the knowledge that it is to be used in court proceedings. I am aware that it is an offence to make a statement that is known by me to be false or intended by me to mislead.
